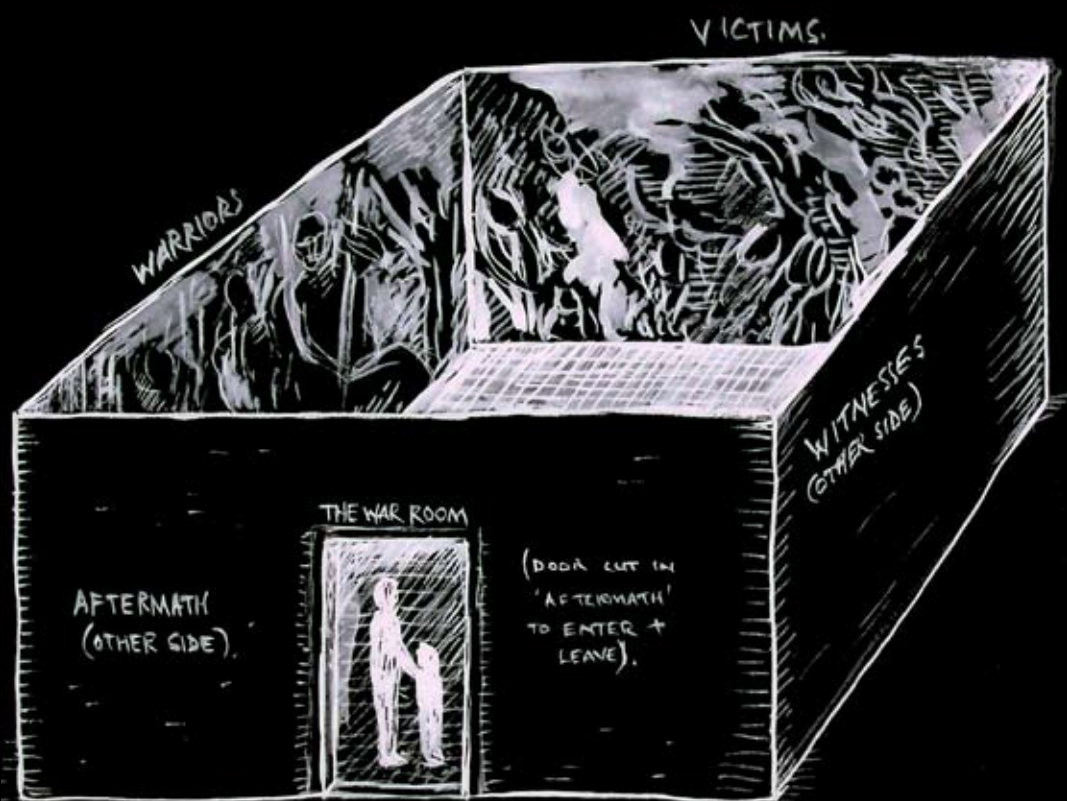

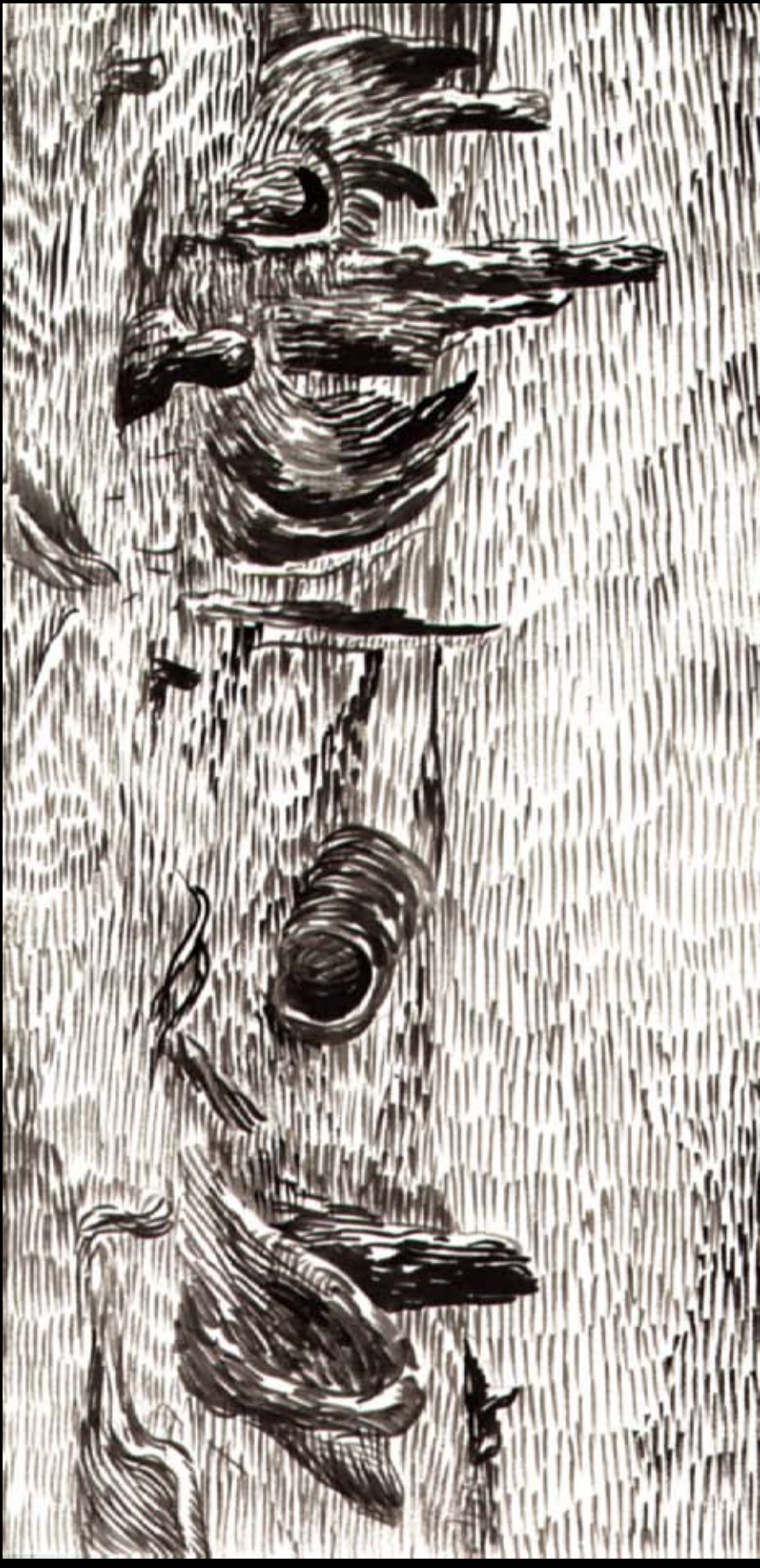

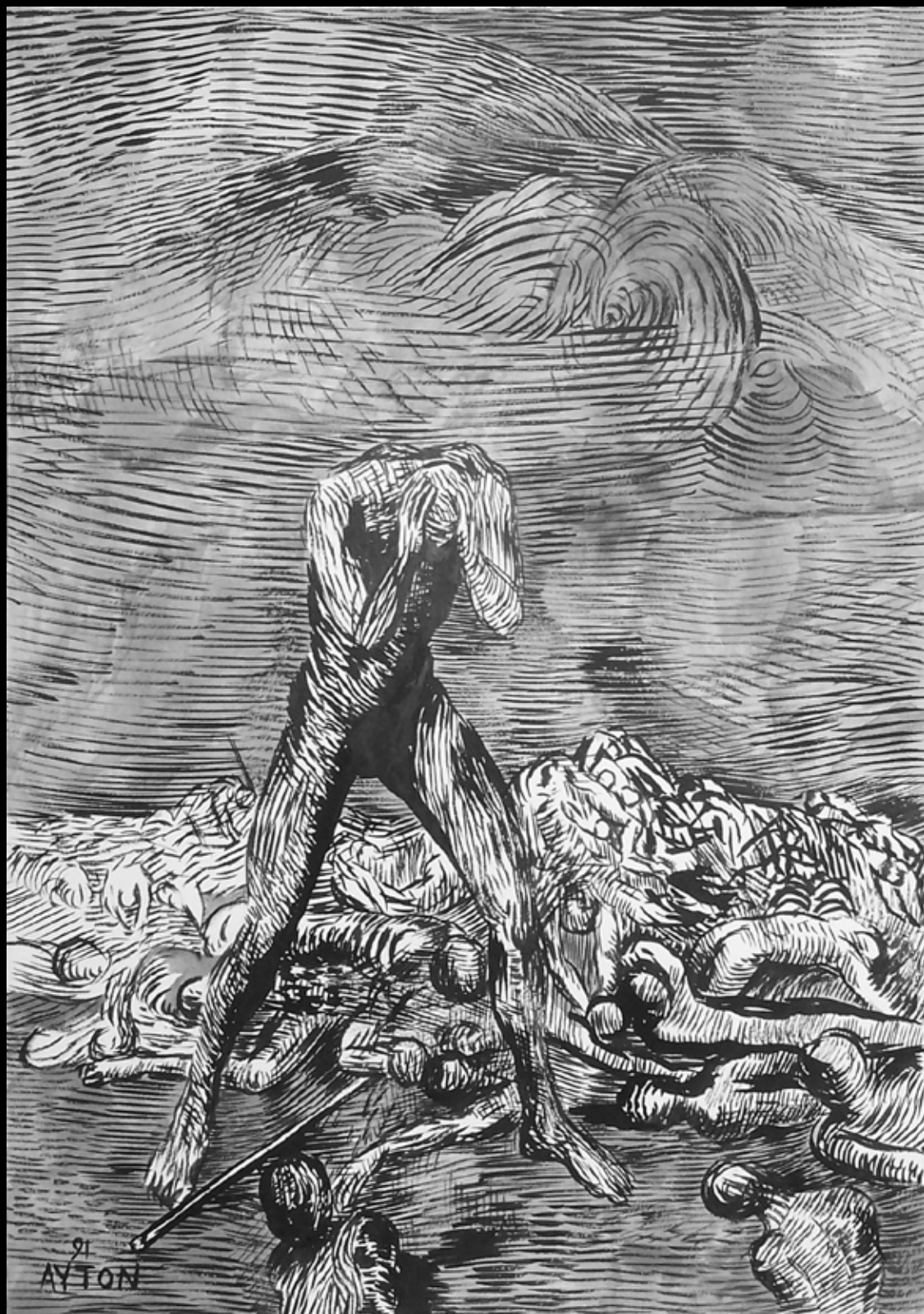

The "Warriors" panel incorporated a shelf that was a permanent part of the space.

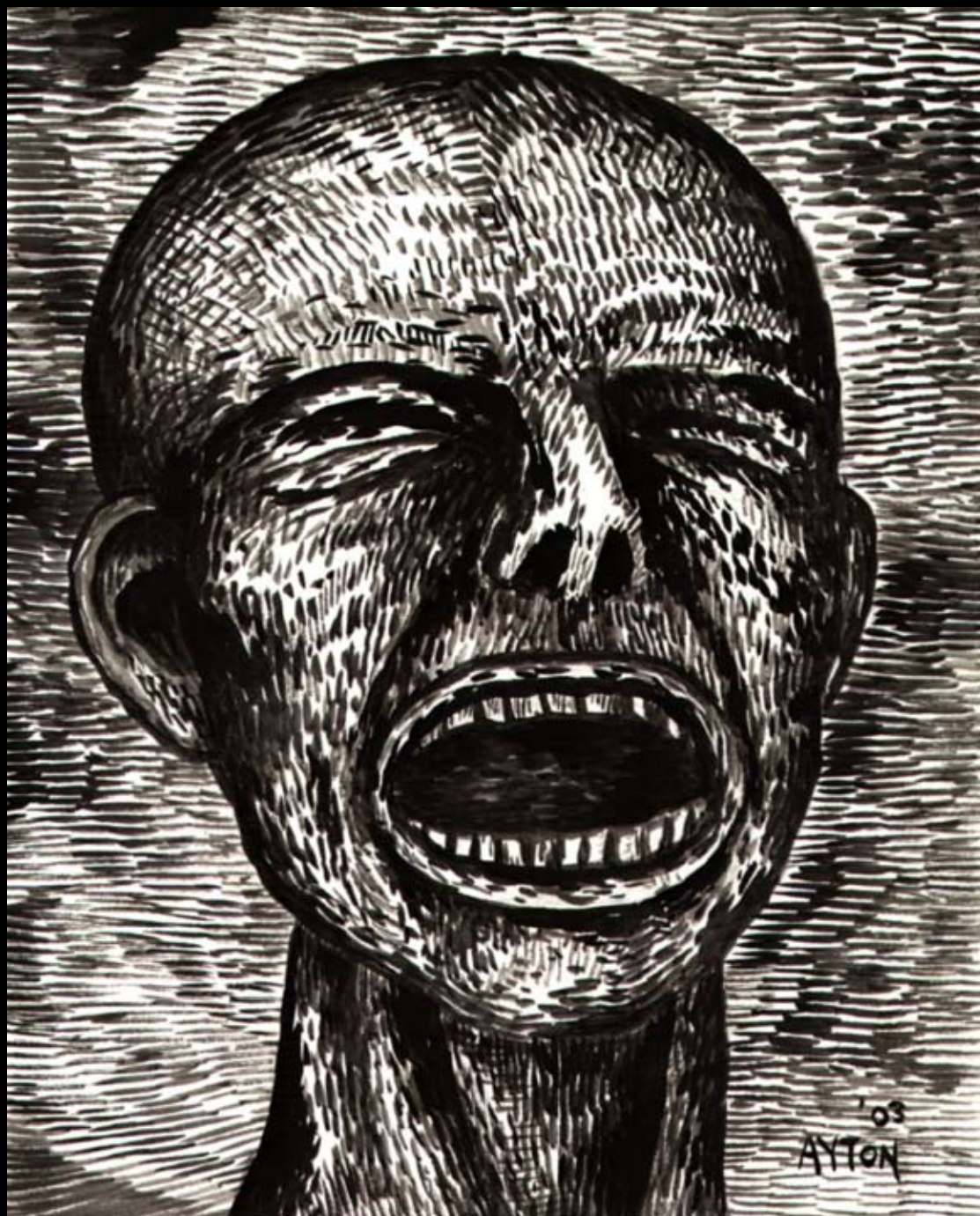

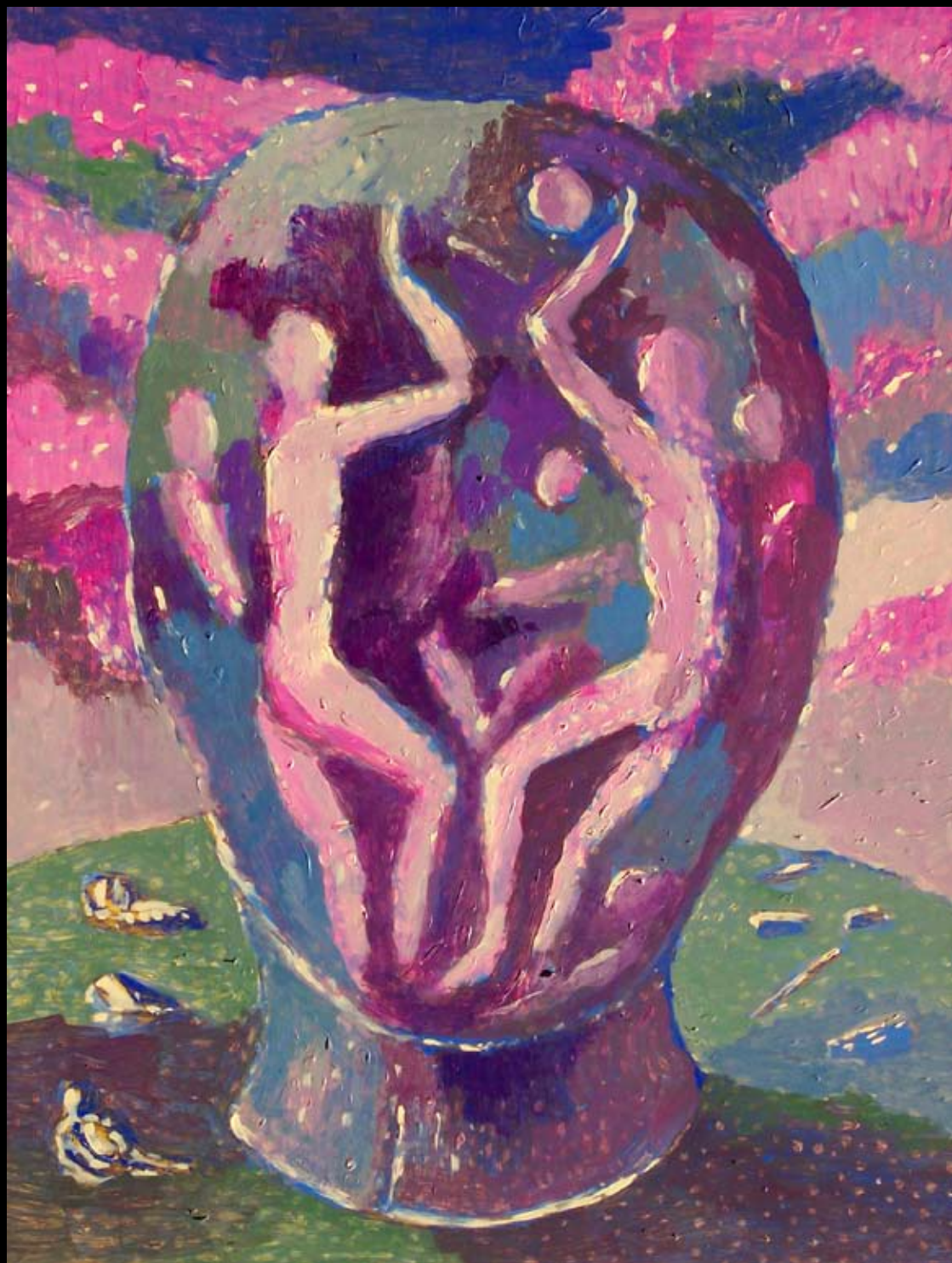

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THE WAR ROOM—You Can't Look Away



The War Room is an ongoing art installation project by US-based British artist, William T. Ayton. It has been exhibited in New York City (chashama, 2004) and Poughkeepsie, NY (Shahinian Gallery, 2004). It has been featured in *The Boston Globe*, *Chronogram*, and *Direct Art Magazine*, as well as in many other publications, both in print and online.

The War Room was conceived after Colin Powell gave a speech leading up to the Iraq war at the United Nations in February 2003, during which a tapestry of Picasso's great anti-war work, *Guernica*, was covered up for the TV cameras. Ayton was outraged by this, and decided to respond by creating an installation that by definition would be very difficult to cover up.

The War Room envelops the viewer in a four-wall painted environment depicting the four faces of war; The Warriors; The Victims; The Witnesses; and The Aftermath. The viewer literally has no place to turn to avoid compelling and thought-provoking images of war and its consequences.

This portfolio features many of the sketches and drawings relating to **The War Room**, as well as photographs of the installations, and also related and precursor works. As it was partly inspired by *Guernica*, a monochrome artwork, **The War Room** itself is monochrome. The images are reproduced in color to enhance their tonalities, and the final section of the publication features reproductions of 5 full-color paintings on related themes.
